

The Society was founded in 1869 and became a registered charity in 1985 with registration number 291604. Its governing instrument is the constitution adopted on 4 March, 1983 as amended on 22 March, 1985, 16 March, 1999 and 21 March, 2006.

The management of the affairs of the Society is in the hands of a Council consisting of Vice Presidents, officers and elected members as listed opposite.

The Society President is nominated by Council to serve for one year and is a person who has made a significant contribution to the understanding of natural history.

The objectives of the Society are:

to promote, organise, carry on and encourage education of the public and study and research for the advancement of knowledge in natural sciences and to protect endangered species.

To furtherance of the above objects but not further or otherwise the Society may:

- publish papers on the natural sciences, especially those relating to Norfolk.
- encourage the exchange of information between naturalists by means of meetings and excursions.
- protect endangered species by the collection of information, cooperative surveys, investigations and the dissemination of the useful results of such investigations.
- do all such other lawful things as shall further the attainment of the above objects.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

The council has pleasure in presenting this Annual Report and Accounts for the year ending December 31st 2017.

Membership at the end of 2017 stood at 607 (594 in 2016). This small increase will hopefully continue apace. The ability to now make payment for membership via the website should not only ensure that this is the case but will also inflict less work in administering the payment of subscriptions upon the hard-working Membership Secretary. I would take this opportunity to remind members that membership can be offered as a gift!

The Society ended the year with general account reserves of £19 780, an increase of £500 on the previous year. Peet Fund reserves at the year-end were £9 260. Our treasurer, Robert Maidstone, did a sterling caretaking job in ensuring the books balance. He also redistributed the Society's monetary assets to best effect. Robert recently moved away from the role and the Society is now looking for a new treasurer. Our assistant treasurer Jim Froud is continuing to stand in, ably assisted by a number of council members working as a finance group.

The evening talks presented by the Society have always been a part of what we are about and 2017 was no exception. The programme committee once again put together a fantastic and popular series of events worth attending. Alan Walker, Carl Sayer, Rob Spray, Simon Partridge and Pam Taylor all gave entertaining talks on subjects as varied and far ranging as How Hill, the river Glaven, the European Eel, The north Norfolk chalk reef and the dragonflies and other wildlife of Madagascar. The enthusiastic contribution by all the speakers is very much appreciated. I would also like to thank the workers who laid out the hall, served refreshments and manned the projector.

The Photographic Group met several times during the course of the year and continue to share ideas and techniques and I would remind you is open to all members.

The programme of workshops and field meetings has continued throughout the summer months with bees, lichens, plants, wild flowers, farmland, Buckenham Carrs, dragonflies, caddisflies, microscopy, fungi and mosses all coming under scrutiny. Thank you to the organisers and participants alike in making them all entertaining and successful.

The Research Committee under the watchful eye of Tony Irwin has continued to pull together research on the fauna and flora at Winterton. This will come to fruition in 2018 with the publication of the findings.

The Publications Committee under the hard working Tony Leech saw the publication of the 2016 Bird and Mammal Report which was very well received. The great articles and photographs included are a tribute to Andy Stoddart (Bird Report and photographic editor), Francis Farrow (Mammal Report editor) and Peter Lindsley (layout) and I give you my word there was no favouritism over the use of the cover photograph! The days of our former chairman parcelling each copy up individually and taking them to the post office in a wheelbarrow are thankfully now long gone. Not only is the packaging and postage service now carried out by our printers but it is done at less cost.

The Norfolk Natterjack, our quarterly newsletter, allows members to contribute a wide variety of articles. The publication is excellently edited by Francis Farrow. An ever increasing number of queries, photographs and findings are also being reported by members on the Society's Facebook page. Thanks are due to Andy Musgrove for acting as our administrator.

During the year there has been a fundamental change to the Society's Website. In the age we live in this is the main interface we have with the public at large and many of our members. The site has had a good overhaul during 2017 whilst retaining integrity to the former content. It now includes a shop and online payment facilities. These changes constitute a large amount of hard work by Jim Froud. Included in the website we now have access to many of our publications online. The digitising of former Transactions, Bird and Mammal Reports and Natterjack has been arranged by Nick Owens at no cost via the Biodiversity Heritage Library project with the scanning carried out by the NHM in London. Instant access to almost 150 years of publications and articles represents a huge leap forward in the research capability for students and researchers alike both those here in Norfolk and others around the UK and abroad. The impact of this must not be underestimated.

I am pleased that during the course of the year we have had the chance to strengthen relationships with other wildlife organisations within the county. The NT, NWT, NE and Norwich Castle Museum all continue to have representation at council meetings. The Society's relationship with the Norfolk Biodiversity Information Service (NBIS) continues to be a strong one and working arrangements continue to be developed with county recorders. George Carrick of the Membership Committee continues discussion and development with NBIS to produce a 'Wildlife Identification Application' for children and adults.

The role of our county recorders is in my opinion under appreciated by many. They put in long hours and hard work frequently at personal expense for no monetary reward and often little thanks. I'd like to put that right. County recorders are the backbone of the information the society produces. Please support them with prompt submission of records and a measure of understanding.

In 2017 Peter Aspinall and John Crouch came to the end of term of office as members of council and I thank them for their service. The day to day organisation of the Society is completed by the four committees. I extend my gratitude to all who have contributed. I would like to extend my personal thanks firstly to our former chairman Tony Leech: Tony has lent me his ear of experience on numerous occasions. Secondly, Nick Owens, our secretary, who not only ensures I'm in the right place at the right time but also meticulously checks what I produce. Thank you both.

Lastly but not least I would like to thank every single member. Without you our great society would simply not exist.

Time moves forever on and 2019, our 150th anniversary of inauguration, gets closer. Arrangements are in place to ensure it does not go unnoticed both by our members and the wider public at large. I'm looking forward to reporting on that in a future Chairman's Report.
